Three Year Capital Plan

032/2024 Trustee Stewart moved that the Board of Trustees approve the Division's 2025-2028 Three-Year Capital Plan for submission to the Government of Alberta.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

Elk Island Catholic School Division engaged Edmonton Public Schools (EPSB) to develop a 3-year Capital Plan to address the Division's low utilisation rates and most pressing facility concerns. In discussion with senior administration, it was determined that in addition to a 3-year Capital Plan, an integrative 3-year Capital and 10-year Facility Plan would help identify a strategic direction for future capital request over the next ten years and beyond.

The key objectives of this study were as follows:

- Ensure that students are accommodated in communities as close to home as possible.
- Establish a path to an effective and efficient use of Division space and resources.

 Develop an advocacy tool to address the most pressing infrastructure needs of the Division.

The following recommendations are divided into short, medium and long-term timeframes in order to establish a facility strategy that includes maintenance, environment, programming and student accommodations. Short-term priorities are generally identified as the Division's 3-year Capital Plan. Medium and long-term recommendations take into consideration the time required to prepare capital funding requests to Alberta Education:

Short Term Recommendations (1-3 years):

Fort Saskatchewan: 2 to 1 Consolidation

Zone 2 Fort Saskatchewan

Pending the outcome of a Value Scoping session, the Division will request planning funding for a new accommodation solution in Fort Saskatchewan. (\$20M)

Sherwood Park: 2 to 1 Consolidation

Zone 1 - Sherwood Park

Consideration of a 2 to 1 consolidation of K-4 schools in Sherwood Park. Request for a value scoping session and public engagement to explore options aimed at reducing excess capacity in Zone 1, increasing utilization, improving learning environments, and determining the best location of a replacement school. (\$20.6M)

Vegreville: 2 to 1 Consolidation

Zone 5 - Vegreville

Funding to explore a right-sizing option involving a K-12 consolidation in either St. Martin's or St. Mary's School. Request for a value scoping workshop/consolidation study and public engagement to develop options aimed at reducing excess capacity in Zone 5. (Option 1: \$10.8M / Option 2: \$14.1)

Medium Term Recommendations (4-6 Years):

Sherwood Park Rural: 2 to 1 Consolidation

Zone 2 - Sherwood Park Rural

Funding to explore a right-sizing option in Zone 2. Request for a value scoping workshop and public engagement to develop options aimed at reducing excess capacity, increasing utilization, and improving learning environments. (TBD)

Long Term Recommendations (7-10 Years):

New K-8 School

Zone 1 - Sherwood Park

Superintendent's Briefing:

ASBA Edwin Parr Award - Outstanding First Year Teacher

April 17, 2024

Background:

Each year the ASBA honours six outstanding first-year teachers with the Edwin Parr Teacher Award. School boards may nominate any first-year K to 12 teacher who has taught in an Alberta school jurisdiction which is a member of the ASBA.

Edwin Parr was President of the Alberta School Trustees' Association from 1956 to 1962. The Award was set up to honour his memory and to recognize outstanding first year teachers.

Process:

Principals are asked to nominate any first year teachers in their schools that have done an outstanding job. The nomination package, with all supporting documents, is forwarded to the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources. One teacher is selected to represent EICS at the Zone level. Normally, ASBA hosts a zone banquet to celebrate and recognizes all the zone level nominees and will award two teachers as the zone winners. At the ASBA Fall General meeting, the 6 provincial winners will be recognized.

Superintendent's Briefing:

CCSSA Excellence in Catholic Education Award(s)

April 17, 2023

Background:

Each year the Council of Catholic School Superintendents of Alberta honors one teacher or school administrator from each Catholic jurisdiction in the province who has done an exemplary job in preparing our youth to grow into outstanding Catholic citizens. Nominees are passionate about Catholic education and the students they teach, inspire their students, and demonstrate commitment to Catholic education and teaching excellence.

An EICS Excellence in Catholic Education award for Support Staff. This award mirrors the CCSSA award, but is designed for our support staff.

Process:

Personnel are invited to submit names of nominees, along with a statement of support detailing the rationale for the nomination. The nomination package, with all supporting documents, is forwarded to the Assistant Superintendent, Student and Staff Formation.

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 21: School Fees and Charges establishes that the Board shall approve the Division Fee Schedule during the spring budgeting process to set what fees may be charged and what maximums may be charged for each fee. Fee schedules include Board and School determined mandatory and optional fees as described below.

Recommended Changes:

Pre-Kindergarten and Full Day Kindergarten

Administration has determined that the fees charged for Full Day Kindergarten and Pre-Kindergarten programs are mandatory fees that require the same fee to be charged division wide and have therefore moved these fees to the Division Fee Schedule from the individual school fee schedules.

Technology Fee

The addition of a Technology Fee of \$30.00 per student for all students of EICS is recommended to subsidize the increasing cost of providing technology for our students. The new fee would be used to provide for both the hardware and software needs of schools. Survey data from the recent Assurance Stakeholder engagement shows that technology hardware like smart boards in schools is aging and there aren't enough Chromebook devices to meet the needs of students who either can't afford or forget their devices. The fee will also go toward the increasing subscription costs of software used to enhance the delivery of instruction to students.

In researching the validity of introducing this new fee to families, administration reached out to other school divisions in the province and found most were charging a similar fee. Below is a list of comparables:

Lunch Hour Supervision

Administration has determined that the fee for Lunch Hour Supervision should be the same across the Division since it is determined by the cost to employee the Supervisor for the role. This is a fixed cost that doesn't fluctuate and the difference between the rate for K-4 and 5-8 schools is the number of Supervisors required based on the age of students.

Chesterton Academy

In consultation with the Principal and Vice-Principal of St. Isidore Learning Centre the fee for Chesterton Online Students was determined to be too high. The school had received numerous inquiries about the program but very few actual registrations. The overall driving factor mentioned by families was that the cost was more than they were willing to pay. Therefore, the cost per credit has been lowered for both Out of Province and International Chesterton schools to attempt to grow this program.

Summer School

The addition of a \$50.00 per student fee for Summer School is recommended to cover the additional cost of custodial time and materials that are not normally incurred in the summer at schools.

Transportation

Administration is recommending leaving transportation fees the same as the previous year. The potential upcoming negotiations may affect the salary and benefit costs of the division. The increase in fuel costs due to the carbon tax increases will also have an affect on expenses.

Rental Rates for Community Use of EICS Facilities

Administration is recommending an increase to all fees for community use of EICS facilities. Increases are necessary to cover the increased cost of utilities and salary/benefit costs of caretakers.


