

EICS and the Board of Trustees sincerely thank everyone for their comments on the draft school calendar. All comments and feedback received were recorded and taken into consideration when deciding on the 2009-10 school calendar for Our Lady of Mount Pleasant Catholic School. It is important to note that a number of significant underlying factors were considered in making the final decision regarding the 4-day calendar.

1. **Importance of increasing the presence of Catholic education in Camrose**
2. **The need to increase high school enrollment**
3. **The opportunity to provide greater program options for students**

How much feedback on the Calendars did the Board of Trustees receive?

Feedback was solicited through an online survey, a comment form, by email, fax, phone, as well as a parent information night held at OLMP Catholic School. The response rate for the feedback included 40 online survey responses and 32 comments generated by the comment form, email, fax and phone.

What kind of comments did the feedback include?

The feedback on the 4-day calendar for OLMP can be categorized as follows:

1. **Busing**
2. **Longer School Day**
3. **Activities on Fridays**
4. **Work Experience and Community Involvement**

Busing – Our Camrose Catholic Boundary includes the City of Camrose only. Transportation for our urban students will not be impacted. Students who reside in the rural area around Camrose are outside of our Camrose Catholic Boundary. In the past, these students were able to access busing from Battle River Public Schools. Unfortunately, due to the proposed earlier start time (8:20 a.m.) and later end time (3:50 p.m.) at OLMP, Battle River is no longer able to offer transportation for our rural OLMP students. *PLEASE NOTE: Rural students attending St. Patrick Catholic School are not impacted, and therefore, will still be able to access Battle River busing to St. Patrick.*

OLMP Catholic School and the Division transportation department are working to find transportation alternatives or options for our rural students. If a solution is found, we will be contacting the parents of our rural students directly.

Longer School Day – The proposed bell times (school start and end) for OLMP Junior High and High School, for the 2009-10 school year, are 8:20 a.m. (start) and 3:50 p.m. (end). Our students will start school 14 minutes earlier and will finish 36

minutes later - compared to school times this year. The students' lunch hour will also be shortened from 46 minutes to 30 minutes. Some feedback comments included concern about possible interference with after school activities. EICS and OLMP, as a result, are still looking at school bell times for next year, whether they can be adjusted or not. Information regarding the bell times for next year will be attached to report cards at the end of the year for OLMP students and Grade 6 students from St. Patrick Catholic School. The information will also be posted on OLMP's website at olmp.eics.ab.ca.

Activities on Friday – EICS received feedback from parents who expressed concerns about their child's activities on Fridays – away from school, at home, or unsupervised. Alternatively, EICS also received feedback from parents who supported the extra day – either to spend time with their children, book appointments, involve their children in the community, or develop work experience. Each feedback response was taken into serious consideration. As a result, OLMP has been gathering information on possible volunteer and community activities that students can become involved in. Parents are invited to visit the school to view the information or request a copy of the information. Alternatively, parents and students can visit the Camrose Volunteer Centre for more detailed and complete information on volunteering in Camrose and Camrose County.

Work Experience and Community Involvement -

A number of feedback responses from parents mentioned greater opportunities for work experience and community involvement for their children. Students are encouraged to make an appointment to meet with OLMP's School Counsellor regarding work experience opportunities.

Other Questions Regarding the Division Calendar

November Fall Break – In order to standardize the school calendar, EICS had to align its busing with Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS), which schedules the November fall break. Other considerations include the increase in tendencies for families to take children out of school for fall holidays, as well as increasing the preparation time for teachers completing report cards – which will be issued after the fall break.

Early Christmas Break – Again, because of transportation considerations in all of our communities, the Christmas break schedule will begin December 21 with students returning to school on January 4, 2010. All schools within EICS will have the same schedule. In order to start the Christmas break later in the week, it would cost the Division up to \$20,000 per day to provide busing for our students in all communities – not to mention that EICS would be contracting out public school bus drivers and buses to provide the service – when otherwise they would be on their Christmas break.

Start of School Year -

The first day of school is scheduled for August 31, 2009 in order to accommodate the 2009 WorldSkills Event in Calgary from September 1-7, 2009. The Alberta government, because of the world-class event, has committed \$4 million to send students in Grades 9 and 10 to the competition.

By attending the WorldSkills competition, our students will have the opportunity to explore a variety of trades and technology occupations and learn from the best in the world. Our students will take part in Try-A-Trade Demonstrations – a hands-on look at some of the most in-demand occupations, as well as the Learning Opportunities and Career Pathways Showcase – an event with over 100 trade and technology focused employers, partners, and educational institutions. Students will also have the opportunity to interact with experienced Skills Ambassadors who will be presenting valuable information about different skills areas.

What is the WorldSkills competition?

WorldSkills 2009 will be the largest event to take place in Calgary since the 1988 Olympics. Held over four days every two years, WorldSkills promotes and displays skilled trades and technology careers to youth. WorldSkills International represents 49 countries and involves 45 skill categories, including plumbing, autobody repair, welding, landscape gardening, printing and web design.

Last Day of School – The last day of school for next year is scheduled for Monday, June 28, 2009 because Diploma examinations are still being written up to, and including, the last day of school. Alberta Education is responsible for

creating the schedule of Diploma examinations throughout the province, not individual school boards.

What is Professional Development and why do we have Division PD days?

Professional Development equips teachers and other Division staff with the tools and knowledge they need to help students reach their full potential. PD also helps to maintain standards of excellence in teaching – giving our teachers the opportunity to collaborate and learn the best and most up-to-date teaching practices, while at the same time, giving our students access to the highest quality of learning.

In the past, due to the eight different school calendars, it wasn't easy for teachers and EICS staff to collaborate with each other. Instead, a small percentage of teachers took their turn participating in PD – thereby requiring substitute teachers at premium cost and significant time away from their students.

Some Professional Development Activities –

Professional Development (PD) helps teachers to continually adapt to changing environments from new technology to new curriculum. Some PD activities will address the following:

Changes to the Education Curriculum -

Alberta Education is continually updating and revising the education curriculum in order to meet the shifting needs of students. As a result, teachers require PD in order to keep up with the changes and to learn the new curriculum.

Below are some of the curriculum changes over the next couple of years:

- French as a Second Language – High School
- Mathematics K-12
- Biology, Chemistry and Physics – Grade 12
- Career and Technology Studies
- Social Studies
- Science - Elementary

Changes in Technology -

Today's students are 21st century learners with access to technology and a constant flow of information.

For example: EICS schools are currently being outfitted with state-of-the-art technology – such as SmartBoard technology in classrooms. In order to teach using the SmartBoard and for students to get the full-benefit of

learning with SmartBoard technology, teachers must know how to use the technology and how it can be applied to lessons and activities. Professional development will help teachers learn to teach with new technology.

Why did EICS change its school calendars?

The main reason for changing the 2009-10 School Calendars was to reduce the number of school calendars throughout the Division, from eight calendars in previous years to the current four calendars. Fewer calendars enhance the ability to offer Division-wide professional development opportunities – enabling staff to provide our students with the most up-to-date instruction practices.

Working with fewer calendars reduces costs and improves efficiency with regard to busing and transportation.

What are some advantages to working with fewer school calendars?

There are a number of advantages to having fewer school calendars, namely:

- Standardizes the Division – all students will have the same days off.
- Easier on parents with children attending different schools
- Creates efficiencies in scheduling and providing student busing
- More opportunities for professional development throughout the Division.
